President's Message

My dearest fellow alumni,

The past half-year of 2020 has been nothing short of a rollercoaster ride for everyone, more so for us in the healthcare profession. I hope everyone has been coping well. We've seen healthcare systems in many developed countries crumble in the face of this pandemic, and I feel comforted that Singapore's COVID cases have fared relatively well compared to what we've heard in other parts of the world.

Through the pandemic, many of us may have felt stressed or even burnt out from all the challenges brought on by COVID. Some have taken care of patients with COVID-19, while putting our loved ones at risk. Some had training affected due to restrictions in movements across hospitals, other had all clinical research activities put on hold. Some may even have family members or friends who were infected with COVID-19. Travel plans have been cancelled. Friends have not met for months, and families have even been temporarily separated.

Through these challenges however are stories of resilience and overcoming challenges.

Duke-NUS, for example, has been repeatedly featured in the news, not only for the all the hard work our Emerging Infectious Diseases (EID) department has led, but also for the care given by our alumni to COVID-19 and non-COVID-19 patients alike. Most, if not all, have agreed to directly manage COVID-19 patients, despite the potential dangers to ourselves and our families. Many Duke-NUS alumni are at the forefront of our response, be it at the dormitories, at primary care or polyclinics, the fever screening areas, the emergency departments, the COVID wards in restructured hospitals, and also in the offices planning our workflows.

We have found ways to keep in touch with loved ones within Singapore or overseas, while anxiously waiting for the time we can finally see them in person again. Some have even welcomed new family members during the Circuit Breaker, facing the challenges of parenthood without the usual help of doting grandparents, who were initially not allowed to visit their grandkids.

We have found new habits to stay fit and healthy. Some have taken up cycling, zoom gym or yoga classes. Many have started or restarted running during their new-found free time.

We have come up with innovations to ensure patient care is not compromised during the pandemic, for instance the development of telemedicine.

The pandemic has also reshaped how we carry out academic activities. For example, those preparing for exams have formed online study groups. We have participated in virtual international conferences in the comforts of our own homes or offices. In the past month, we have also enhanced the education of our medical students within the constraints of the social distancing rules.

Duke-NUS had both its first online white coat ceremony for the new Class of 2024, and also held the nation's first oath-taking ceremony for the newest members of our alumni, the Class of 2020.

The number of adjustments and innovations that the pandemic brought on are countless. No matter the difficulties, our lives have progressed, and I have faith that we will not only recover, but even emerge to a new better life, armed with the resilience learned from these challenges.

Of course, I am aware that my experiences are very much skewed to what's been happening in SGH. Some of us may have vastly different experiences in other institutions or even in other countries. At our first online Alumni Happy Hour on July 17, we thoroughly enjoyed hearing from our alumni around the island and from outside of clinical medicine, sharing how their lives have been shaped by the pandemic. We may not be able to hear from everyone, but do drop us an e-mail, a text, or better yet, join us at our next online event, the upcoming Annual General Meeting on the 9th of September.

I hope everyone stays safe. I wish you happiness and good health in these challenging times. Hopefully, we can all meet in person and catch up as one big alumni family soon.

Post PGY1 Experience Survey 2019

In a survey about their experiences in PGY1, 34 alumni from the class of 2018 responded. This represents 50% of the cohort (of 68) and gave us valuable feedback on how Duke-NUS has prepared them for PGY1, how the school can continue to improve our MD programme for subsequent Duke-NUS student cohorts, and how we can continue to assist our alumni in their career aspirations.

68%

Most post-PGY1 alumni felt well prepared for the first year of training. Across 13 Entrustable Professional Activities*, majority of the respondents felt as well or better prepared than their peers.

Intended Career

The majority of respondents indicated they would like to pursue a 'Clinician Plus' career.

21% indicated interest in Clinician Leader as an aspect of their intended career
