

NUS INITIATIVE TO IMPROVE HEALTH IN ASIA

The National University of Singapore (NUS) Initiative to Improve Health in Asia (NIHA) was established in 2010 with funding support from the Singapore Economic Development Board (EDB) and GlaxoSmithKline (GSK). This initiative aims to progress public health and healthcare delivery in Asia through the three integrated programmes of Leadership Development. Policy Forums and Research.

NIHA FUTURE LEADERS PROGRAMME

To date, the NIHA Future Leaders Programme (FLP) has attracted leaders in senior positions from over 21 economies in various health ministries and agencies in Asia and Asia-Pacific region.


With the increasingly complex political and economic contexts that healthcare leaders are participating in and especially in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, the need to address health related issues and challenges in novel and innovative ways matters more than ever. The NIHA FLP offers a unique programme, carefully curated with heavy consideration on the potential of health policy leaders to significantly and positively influence the region's healthcare landscape. This includes an interactive introduction to the fundamental principles of innovation and design-thinking, alongside its practical applications in real-world health issues through structured group project work.

The success of the NIHA FLP has resulted from meaningful engagements of participants with faculty comprising internationally recognised leaders and experts from government, academia and corporate sectors. A highlight of past FLPs has been candid conversations with Singapore's former Minister for Health Gan Kim Yong on Singapore's whole-of-government approach to health issues and perspectives on navigating political challenges towards advancing the health agenda. The 2023 FLP will begin with discussions with Singapore's current Senior Minister of State, Dr Janil Puthucheary on re-defining the nation's healthcare priorities through the Healthier SG initiative.

The programme has also involved visits to healthcare and non-healthcare settings to reinforce how innovative thinking from different domains can be harnessed in solving healthcare problems. This has included the Visa Innovation Centre, Singapore's futuristic Gardens by the Bay, GSK Asia House, and Tan Tock Seng Hospital's Centre for Healthcare Innovation.

NIHA FORUM

The ongoing digital revolution has transformed the way people live, work, play, and consume healthcare globally. Singapore is one such example of a Smart Nation that has envisioned a leading economy powered by digital innovation, and a world-class city with a government that responds to citizens' changing needs. To drive the adoption of digital and smart technologies, Singapore has identified key Strategic National Projects and launched a National Artificial Intelligence (AI) Strategy in 2019 to boost the country's AI capabilities. Other governments in the ASEAN and wider Asia-Pacific are also exploring the value of digital solutions in their healthcare systems, but challenges need to be addressed.

To discuss the digital healthcare landscape and issues in Asia-Pacific, the NIHA Policy Forum was first held in 2018 on Digital Health, followed by a second forum in November 2019, which focused on Healthcare-Al.

The 2018 Digital Health Forum brought together key thought leaders from the medical-technology industry, digital health start-up sector, academia and various government agencies to discuss the current digital health landscape in Asia-Pacific.

The 2019 Forum provided insights into the potential impact of AI on healthcare in Asia-Pacific, regulatory challenges, and strategies to ensure appropriate adoption. These discussions involved global perspectives with presenters from different sectors.

This diversity of expert speakers and panellists from academia, government, pharmaceutical and medical device companies, and start-up firms ensured that participants gained a comprehensive and multifaceted understanding of the digital healthcare landscape and regulatory challenges in the region. The participants' own diverse professional backgrounds facilitated networking across sectors, serving as a catalyst for potential future collaborations in digital health.

The 2023 NIHA Forum will constitute the last day of the FLP and is significant in that it marks the final event of NIHA as the initiative ends its 10th run this year. The public forum is themed "Transforming Healthcare for the Next Decade", with a specific focus on Digital Health, Artificial Intelligence and Healthcare Systems and addresses the question "Are we ready for a Digital Health Future?". The forum will feature experts from Singapore's Ministry of Health and the public healthcare clusters, and key thought leaders from academia and the private sector.

Attendees will include participants from the FLP as well as professionals from healthcare service sectors, and members from regulatory and government institutions.

Professor John Lim is founding Executive Director of the Centre of Regulatory Excellence (CoRE), inaugural Chairman of the Consortium for Clinical Research and Innovation Singapore, Senior Advisor to Singapore's Ministry of Health (MOH), and Policy Core Lead at the SingHealth Duke-NUS Global Health Institute. He was formerly Chief Executive Officer of Singapore's Health Sciences Authority and MOH' Deputy Director of Medical Services (Industry & Research Matters). Professor Lim draws on his international experience and networks to enhance regulatory capacity, scientific excellence and policy innovation for health products, services and systems in Southeast Asia and Asia-Pacific.

Adj A/Prof Raymond Chua



Adjunct Associate Professor Raymond Chua is a Registered Public Health Specialist and Fellow with the Academy of Medicine. As Deputy Director-General of Health, he oversees the regulation of healthcare services, premises, and health digitalization in Singapore, to safeguard public health, assure patient safety and ensure healthcare innovations. He is concurrently designated as Assistant Commissioner for Cybersecurity in Healthcare, to assist in tracking and enhancing cybersecurity policies relating to Critical Information Infrastructures and Medical Devices in Singapore. He also chairs the Public Service Division's Regulatory Advisory Group to provide guidance and broad direction in using regulatory tools and capability development of regulators in the public service.

Dr Anne-Valérie is the Dean for Executive Education at HEC Paris and Professor of Strategy and Business Policy. Her areas of expertise include strategy, innovation and entrepreneurship. She has lived and worked in Europe, South Africa, the Middle East, the U.S. and Asia. Anne-Valérie has published several books and she is currently working on a new book on women leaders, to be published in March 2024.
